

Term two is certainly disappearing fast. We hope everyone is still fit and healthy as this cold weather has suddenly hit.

Term one disappeared quickly. The children



enjoyed our fun pirate & princess activities concluding with a treasure hunt. The pirate ship and princess castle

were certainly busy areas allowing the children to explore a variety of roles through dramatic play.

This dramatic play was taken even further when the children were given the opportunity to dramatise a variety of stories at group time. This is a great way to recall the story in sequence whilst enjoying the fun of drama. Retelling stories is an important pre reading skill as it shows understanding of the spoken word.

The children also enjoyed a variety of Easter activities. One of these activities was a science activity that demonstrated the shrinking process.

The children placed a plastic cover over a plastic egg. The egg was then dipped into hot water by an adult as the children watched the plastic cover shrink. While some children understood what had happened and could explain it for others, it was a very new concept.

Last term the children enjoyed exploring our large tarp slide. This is a large canvas tarp that attaches to the side of the climbing frame. The children loved sliding down the large surface in many different ways.

Last term water played a big role in the sandpit. We found ourselves adding a lot of water to the sand so the children could build with it. This provided opportunities to discuss dry, wet, same, different and change. It was great to then hear the older children explaining to the younger children that they needed the dark wet sand.

Friendships are continuing to develop which is wonderful to see. The children are all very settled and understand and follow the routine with ease.

This term the children were busy with Special



Kinder Business. They were very excited to have their mums at kinder for lunch and we hope you enjoyed the yummy dessert they made and your special gift.

We had a visit from some of the residents of Emerald Glades aged care facility. This was a wonderful experience for the children and the residents. It provided the children with the opportunity to interact with elders in a safe supportive atmosphere. It was wonderful to watch the children explaining things to them and helping them play. This is going to become a regular part of our program. The next visit is late June.

We were lucky to have Christine from the responsible pet program visit us with her dog, Breeze. Christine taught the children how to be safe around dogs.

We have visited the convention centre to collect autumn leaves. The children love exploring the



open space and collecting leaves to play with at kinder. The children were also able to explore the great playground at the convention centre.

We also have two visits to Belgrave South Primary school library planned for Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> & Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> June. This is a great opportunity for the children to experience a school and a library and computer lab. Term three overview and duty rosters will be available shortly.



#### Hi Everyone,

Well it's that time already heading towards the end of term and have we been busy, yes, we have. We have had so many opportunities this term for the children to learn new skills and gain confidence in themselves and their learning through play and group experiences. Here are just a few things that your child is learning when they come to kinder.

 At the start of the term we began Welcome to country. A simple verse about thanking the



Wurundjeri people of the Kulin nation for letting us share their land. The children know it well and I'm sure if you ask them they will be

able to tell you about it and do the actions. This is a lovely way for the children to give thanks and begin to respect the people and the land around us, also including animals, plants, themselves and their friends.

 Thank you so much for getting on board with collecting the bottle tops and bread tags. The children are so enthusiastic about collecting them and our container gets filled every week.
As a group we then sort them out into two different containers.





The children have an understanding about where the tops and tags go and what they are made into. It allows them to get an understanding of recycling and that one thing can be used and made into something else.

We have done a huge unit on different emotions this term, talking about a different emotion every week and talking about how we feel when we are happy, sad, angry, frightened, surprised and shy. The children are starting to recognise the different emotions and what they feel like. This helps the children to express themselves and that it's ok to feel different emotions. We all say that happy is the best emotion because it makes us feel good and we smile and laugh a lot when we feel happy.



Over the last couple of weeks Sylvie and I have introduced our talking circle and talking stick. We do this at the start of the

day as the children are generally very keen to tell us things that have happened. We have a circle of fabric that the children sit

around and we have a special stick. The person with the stick can speak and everyone else needs to listen. The children may not have anything to tell and that is ok but every child has the opportunity to tell the group some news. It's just a nice way for the children to be heard and to learn to listen to and show respect for each other. It's working really well now that the children understand the concept.

One other thing I would like to share with you is how amazing your children are at cleaning up our room. The pack up music



goes on and all the children get in and help. The part they love the best is helping wipe down the tables and chairs. Again, it's just a simple way for the children to

have respect for belongings and to help each other and work together to make our room great. We are very proud of them.

Some lovely residents from Emerald Glades aged care facility visited our kinder which was a wonderful experience for everyone. The children loved showing them the crafts at kinder and they enjoyed the interaction with the children. This will be a regular addition to our program.

Thank you to all of you that came to our



Mother's Day morning tea. It was such a beautiful and special morning that it brought tears to

my eyes. The children were so excited to have you there.

#### RECYCLING UPDATE

A bit of an update on one of our recycling projects. Our bottle caps and bread tags venture has been met with much enthusiasm in our community. It has been amazing. The sorting and recycle plant have been very impressed with our efforts when the caps and bread tags are delivered at the end of each term. As can be seen by the photos, our little kinder is doing a great job. Below is a recap of how these items are processed and the benefits they bring to those in need.

#### 1. Cap it for Prosthetics

Plastic bottle caps are required which will be turned into filament to make prosthetic hands and limbs for children in disadvantaged communities. A 3-D printer designs each hand for specific children to allow them to undertake basic tasks such as picking up a cup. We are asking you to collect hard plastic caps from fizzy drinks, fruit juices, milk and other similar products and bring them into the kindergarten clean.





#### 2. Bread tags for Wheelchairs

We are also collecting bread tags. These are recycled into seedling trays and the money from the sale of these trays goes directly to the purchase of wheelchairs for disabled children and adults who would otherwise not have access to such mobility. 72 wheelchairs were donated in 2018.
